Fishes

Brook trout Minnows Redbelly dace Finescale dace Pearl dace Banded killifish

Physical Characteristics

Area - 36 acres Average depth - 7 feet Maximum depth - 12 feet Temperatures: Surface - 70°F 12 feet - 68°F

Principal fishery: Brook trout

Daigle Pond was chemically reclaimed in 1963 to remove competing species and provide for intensive management of brook trout. Water quality continues to be an issue as the upper basin experiences algae blooms Since reclamation a good trout fishery has existed at Daigle Pond with annual stocking of fingerling brook trout. Four new species have become established since reclamation in 1967 probably through illegal introductions or the illegal use of live bait. Springs within the pond likely provide a temperature refuge during warmer summer months.

Prohibition on use or possession of live fish as bait is critical to prevent other introductions of undesirable species.

Access to the pond is by paved roads. Small boats or canoes must be hand carried to the pond since no boat launch is available.
