Physical Characteristics

Area - 1029 acres

Temperatures: Surface - 70°F 100 feet - 41°F

Maximum depth - 118 feet

Principal fisheries: Landlocked salmon, lake trout, brook trout, muskellunge

Glazier Lake is located on the St. Francis River on the Maine / New Brunswick border. The shoreline is little developed on the Maine side with steep forested ridges rising from the water's edge. The Canadian side is less scenic and has several camps along the shoreline. The lake is deep with a large volume of cold, well-oxygenated water.

Glazier Lake supports wild populations of togue, salmon and brook trout. Supplemental stockings of these fish have also been done by Maine and New Brunswick. Muskellunge have accessed the lake from the St. John River via the outlet and now provide an attractive sport fishery for large adult fish.

Access to Glazier Lake from the Maine side is via private gravel roads built and maintained by industrial landowners for forest management purposes. An unimproved seasonal access is located at the foot of the main lake. An improved boat launch is available on the New Brunswick shore. Travel to this access is via the Fort Kent border crossing.

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
