Seal Cove Pond is located on the extreme western side of Mount Desert Island. The pond's eastern shore is in Acadia National Park, and a public boat access site at the southeastern end is reached via a park road.

The pond provides marginal habitat for brown trout. During the summer, suitable habitat is limited which probably restricts growth. In most years, brown trout provide a modest fishery for 13-16 inch fish. During a fall, 1993, trapnetting survey, fishery biologists captured two age V+ brown trout weighing from 2 3/4-3 1/2 pounds.

Although smallmouth bass are uncommon, some reach large size. Several 4-pound fish were captured during the 1993 trapnetting survey. This water's ability to grow some exceptionally large smallmouths is noteworthy as not many Downeast waters are capable of growing 3 1/2 pound smallmouths.

Pickerel were illegally introduced around 1990. A sample of 42 of these fish captured in 1993 averaged 17 inches in length and 1 1/4 pounds in weight. This ill-advised introduction will only contribute to a further decline in the quality of the brown trout fishery.
