Area - 178 acres Temperatures:

Principal fisheries: Largemouth bass, chain pickerel

Nehumkeag Pond has abundant amounts of emergent and floating vegetation. This vegetation combined with good water temperatures and high oxygen levels make this an ideal pond for largemouth bass. Bass anglers report the fishing to be very good for both numbers and size of bass caught.

The outlet of Nehumkeag Pond empties into the Kennebec River thereby affording the opportunity for sea-run alewives to enter the pond. The alewives use the pond for spawning and the young remain in the pond until fall. These young alewives are a valuable forage for the bass.

There is no boat launch facility on Nehumkeag Pond, but the pond can be accessed with a hand-carried boat or canoe.
