Hall Pond is well suited to coldwater fisheries management and is stocked annually with brown trout and brook trout. The illegal introduction of white perch in the early 1980's has restricted trout growth due to competition for food and space. Competition even among the white perch is so severe that the population has now become stunted. The small average size of the perch are unattractive to most anglers.

The Department of Fisheries and Wildlife is investigating the possibility of reclaiming Hall Pond and restocking it with brook trout. Such a project is complicated by the fact that Hall Pond is a back-up water supply for the Town of Hebron.

Currently Hall Pond is open to fishing in both summer and winter with special fishing regulations in effect. Anglers should consult their law books to note these special regulations.

There is a small unimproved launch area located along Hall Pond Road. This site is large enough to accommodate canoes and small boats.
