

MARSHALL POND Oxford & Hebron Twps., Oxford Co. U.S.G.S. Poland, Me. (7.5')

Physical Characteristics

Area - 142 acres

Temperatures: Surface - 77°F 38 feet - 52°F

Maximum depth - 41 feet

Principal fisheries: Smallmouth bass

This pond is long and narrow, and its many islands and convoluted shoreline makes this an interesting pond. This water thermally stratifies each summer, but there is almost no cool, oxygenated water for coldwater fisheries management. As a result, the Maine Dept. of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (MDIFW) discontinued stocking trout in the early 1950's and began to manage this pond for its warmwater fish species.

The smallmouth bass fishery appears to be somewhat limited in abundance, but some quality-sized fish are available for the angler. In addition, the Dept. of Marine Resources is stocking sea-run alewives, which should provide excellent forage. This pond contains some extensive weedy coves and submerged weed beds and would provide excellent habitat for largemouth bass. The MDIFW has stocked Hall Pond with largemouth bass, and suspects that they will eventually drop down into Marshall pond and establish themselves.

A small, dirt boat ramp with limited parking is available adjacent to the dam at the outlet.

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
