Proctor Pond, located south of Route 5 in Albany, provides an excellent fishing opportunity for warmwater species. Anglers can expect to catch bass in the 1-3 pound range and occasionally larger. The shallow weedy shoreline provides ideal pickerel habitat and an abundant population of juvenile perch and minnows provides an excellent forage for the bass and pickerel. Black crappie are numerous and also provide a good fishery.

Proctor Pond has suitable water quality to support coldwater fishery management, but the intense competition from the warmwater fish species precludes any trout management.

Access is limited to permissive trespass across private property.
