

Little Frost Pond is an unusually deep, small pond. There is a steep hill along one side of the pond, and it is near this steep hill that the deep water lies. The shoreline is covered with beautiful spruce, fir, and cedar. Little Frost Pond is known for its good trout fishing, and many anglers venture there despite the walk. It is reached by crossing Frost Pond and walking about 3⁄4-mile on a good trail.

The water quality is excellent for brook trout, and oxygen is sufficient for fish down to 50 feet or more. There are no tributaries of any consequence, and the outlet is small and boggy. There are some gravelly areas along the east shore where spring water seeps from the high bank. Trout probably spawn there.

There are only a few species to compete with trout in this pond, and extreme care should be exercised not to introduce any more. For this reason we recommend a no-live-fish-as-bait regulation. Since fishing pressure has increased and there are few areas for trout to reproduce, we also recommend a five-fish limit. These regulations should perpetuate the fishery for the large, wild trout this pond can produce.
