Lily Lake, locally known as Anderson Lake, is located off the Crows Neck Road in Trescott. A dirt road provides vehicular access to the lake where canoes/small boats can be launched at a landing.

This small, shallow lake provides marginal habitat for brook trout. Although summer water temperatures throughout most of the pond are too warm for trout, a small springhole area offers refuge. The fishery is maintained by annual stockings of fall fingerling trout. The spring fishery is generally fairly good with anglers making decent catches of 7-9 in fish. Some have luck casting a worm and bobber from shore, while others troll small lures with good success. During our last check netting in August 1990, we obtained a sample of 10 trout that averaged 10.4 in long, and were in good condition. Unfortunately, small 6-9 in hornpout have become abundant, and because they compete strongly with the trout for food, this restricts the growth rate of the trout.

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
