

Shattuck Lake is a small, cool water pond located in eastern Maine. Access is via a gravel road; small boats/canoes can be launched at a small landing.

This water was reclaimed in 1989 to permit intensive management for brook trout. As anticipated, stocked trout have exhibited very good growth and survival. The pond is producing good fishing for 8-10 inch age I fish and 13-17 inch age II fish. Biologists trap-1994 to monitor netted here in conditions. A good sample of trout was obtained. Age I+ trout averaged 13.0 inches long and 15 oz in weight; age II+ trout averaged 17.5 inches long and 2 lbs.,2 oz in weight. While biologists were pleased with the health of the trout, they were dismayed with the capture of several creek chubs. Anglers need to realize that an introduction of baitfish would produce a decline in the trout fishery. In an effort to maintain angling quality for larger-than-average trout, an ALO regulation and a 2-trout daily bag limit are in effect. If anglers respect these regulations, the pond should provide a good trout fishery for many years.
