

Female breast cancer is the <u>4th</u> leading cause of cancer death.

The 5-year relative survival is **94.4%**.²

Maine ranks 5th highest in the US for breast cancer 5-year survival rate.³

STAGE AT DIAGNOSIS



females diagnosed at a localized stage will survive at least 5 years (vs 4 in 10 at a distant stage).⁵



MAINE CDC CANCER REGISTRY (MCR)

The MCR collects information about all newly diagnosed cancers in Maine residents to better understand cancer, identify areas in need of public health interventions, and improve cancer prevention, treatment, and control.

MAINE CDC BREAST AND CERVICAL HEALTH PROGRAM


The purpose of the MBCHP is to improve access to breast and cervical cancer screening. Through the National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (NBCCEDP), the U.S. CDC helps those with low incomes who do not have adequate insurance gain access to timely breast and cervical cancer screening, diagnostic, and treatment services. NBCCEDP also provides patient navigation services to help them overcome barriers and get timely access to quality care.
