Diphtheria

Fact Sheet





Diphtheria is a disease caused by Corynebacterium diphtheriae bacteria that makes a poison (toxin).



It is spread from person-to-person, usually by coughing or sneezing. Rarely, people get sick from touching fluid from open sores caused by diphtheria.

Signs and Symptoms



Weakness

Sore Throat

Loss of Appetite

Low Fever

A sticky white or gray coating forms on the tonsils, throat, or nose. Other symptoms include hoarseness, barking cough, and skin rash. Severe disease may have swelling of the neck, abnormal heart rhythms, or paralysis.

Symptoms often appear 2-7 days after the bacteria enter the body, but can be up to 10 days later.

Prevention

Getting vaccinated is the best way to prevent diphtheria.
